Harnessing the Energy



Last time I wrote to you, I discussed how spring was breathing new life into our organization. We've continued to harness this energy and are excited to discuss some exciting developments and upcoming opportunities.

On August 1, 2015 our Board completed the official transition to a new technical infrastructure. Based in part on legal research done by Minnesota Justice Foundation volunteer, Julie Matucheski and technology consultation from Duane Lenander, we selected Microsoft Office365 for our technology solution. This ensures that we have secure

storage and email for our organization. As a bonus, through a Microsoft grant, we are able to maintain the software at no cost to our organization. We are thankful for all the support in getting this done, and are pleased that we now have a safe and secure option for storing client, volunteer, and contact information.

We also recently completed a grant application for a Community Crime Prevention grant funding an Administrative Coordinator to support our current strategic tactics in the areas of Partnerships, Sustainability, and Expansion. We envision an Administrative Coordinator assisting WCCC in forming and maintaining partnerships, increasing the volunteer base, maintaining our current communities, and creating new Circle communities, thus creating greater access to Circles in Washington County. A special note of appreciation is due for Kylie LaFontaine, who led the grant-submission process, as well as Jen Lenander, who also assisted in the grant-writing process. Perhaps you saw some of our brainstorming process on Facebook (and no, we couldn't finish all the donuts).

We are launching a new training initiative for current and potential volunteers with an event on Thursday, October 8, 2015. We intend to have ongoing training and networking sessions for all WCCC volunteers in Cottage Grove, Stillwater, and Woodbury. Our first session with be a training by Les Butler from Haven Chemical Health that will provide an overview on Chemical Health. In Memory





The world lost a hero on June 25, 2015. Circle keeper and long-time WCCC-volunteer, Art McKusick, succumbed to cancer.

Art was one WCCC's earliest volunteers in Cottage Grove. Mark LaPointe, another lost hero, worked with Art and talked him into coming to Circle training. After the training, Art was hooked. Art would volunteer on many on-going circles and was always willing to help WCCC clients. He was willing to have people call him, help with job information and other various tasks. Art also took on responsibility from other circle keepers if they were away. He would make sure the circles were held, new circles scheduled and gave a synopsis of what went on for the circle records.

Art also volunteered at the Dakota County Juvenile Center for many years. Art was an asset to Cottage Grove Circle community, as well as the WCCC community. He will be greatly missed.

re·stor·a·tive jus·tice

A system of criminal justice that focuses on the rehabilitation of offenders through reconciliation with victims and the community at large.

There are many different definitions of Restorative Justice, choosing the best one would be a challenge in itself. That also rings true with the applications of Restorative Justice. It can exist in so many different contexts and levels. The most encouraging aspect of Restorative Justice is that it's flexible. The best quality is that it's healing.

The word in itself, *Restorative Justice*, offers those that participate, offender and victim alike, the opportunity to *restore*. Restore trust, restore respect, restore faith or restore "insert your desired value." In the end, it creates an opportunity for wrong doing to be healed and hopefully a chance for those that were involved to move on from the experience with more wisdom and a restoration in the values that were compromised during the wrong doing.

Les Butler has been trained in Circle, participates in the Washington County Offender Recovery Program (ORP), and is Program Director of the Woodbury Haven Chemical Health Systems site.
